SANTA IS COMING TO TOWN (AND HE'LL BE AT THE OP SHOP)





It all started on the 8th August when NRAS welcomed 9 gorgeous Catahoula Leopard X pups into the world. The pups were born and raised in the home of NRAS Shelter Manager Amy and her family; and some wonderful NRAS volunteers jumped in to help with midwife duties including keeping mumma Tully and her pups fed, cleaned and loved. Raising and feeding 9 puppies to an age when they can be desexed,

vaccinated, microchipped and then adopted is an expensive proposition.



So NRAS decided to launch a "puppy sponsorship program". Social media spread the word and before long every one of the 9 puppies had an individual sponsor. For \$100 the puppy sponsor got naming rights, weekly "pupdates" and the opportunity to meet and have lots of cuddles with "their" pup once it had reached 8 weeks of age. All 9 pups were adopted to wonderful homes and mumma dog Tully is now revelling in her pup free status.



September found NRAS seeking foreverhomes for three adorable Labrador puppies. As you can imagine, there was a lot of interest in these labs - two cream and one black. Everyone knows puppies are cute but some say Labrador pups are the cutest. Perfect homes were found for all of them and they went off with their new families accompanied by their very own supply of Frontier Pet Food. Frontier are a local company based in Evans Head, and we were very happy to send our pups off with a supply of their nutritious, delicious, free range organic food.

are desexed, vaccinated and microchipped.

It is important to remember to update your contact details if you move or your telephone number changes. In NSW this update can be done online at www.petregistry.nsw.gov.au or by visiting your local council offices.

At the moment Denise does not have any pets of her own but is looking forward to adopting a rescue dog from NRAS when the time is right.


DECEMBER ADOPTION DAY

BE ALERT BUT NOT ALARMED – IT'S TICK AND SNAKE SEASON

It's that time of the year when paralysis ticks and snakes are very active in the area. A mild winter created ideal breeding conditions for both snakes and ticks.



Be aware of the symptoms of tick paralysis and snake bite and seek veterinary attention urgently if you believe your pet has been bitten by either. In the case of snake bite, do not try to kill the snake but take a photo if possible as this will assist the vet in identifying which antivenin to administer.
